Then check out the NPD website here, where you will find not only information about the "first National Punctuation Day Baking Contest" (what baking has to do with punctuation I have no idea) as well as "Breaking News!" my favorite of which is the stop-the-presses dispatch reporting "Punctuation Man breaks with Associated Press, endorses serial comma," which probably has them shaking in their boots at AP headquarters.

According to a press release that came in over my electronic transom a couple of weeks ago, "NPD is celebrated in schools and businesses

throughout the world with activities, games, programs, and contests. It has inspired people to pay attention not only to their p's and q's, but also their commas, semicolons, and ellipses. NPD reminds us of the importance of proper punctuation for communicating clearly at home, school, or at work.
